


HOW TO PREPARE FOR ECONOMIC COLLAPSE

- 4) Unite and build your local church family.
- 5) Develop basic survival techniques; develop home maintenance skills.
- 6) Maintain supplies for short-term physical survival (no hoarding!).
- 7) Maintain supplies for long-term spiritual survival.
- 8) Pay off all debts quickly.
- 9) Undertake no new debts.
- 10) Invest in the work of the Lord and assist the poor.
- 11) Develop hospitality.
- 12) Prepare to take personal responsibility for children's education and discipline.
- 13) Strengthen moral convictions; set moral standards according to God's word.
- Maintain investments in basic industries, i.e. those having to do with food, clothing, and shelter.

Tribulation Dooms: Final Consequences of Man's Sin

by Dr. Hugh Ross

The physical return of Jesus Christ to the earth will be prefaced, according to Daniel and Revelation, by a seven-year period often referred to as "the tribulation." During this seven-year time span God will pour out upon men and the earth three sequences of dooms, seven dooms in each sequence. The purpose of these dooms is fivefold:

- 1. to destroy one by one, false gods—those things in which people put their trust but which lack security and eternal value (cf Exodus 7 12)
- 2. to shake men to their senses, specifically to a recognition of who Jesus really is
- 3. to bring a countless host of people to salvation (Ezekiel 39:6-8 and Zechariah 13:8-9)
- 4. to judge unbelievers who have habitually hardened their hearts against God
- 5. to bring down upon mankind the consequences of his refusal to manage the earth's resources according to God's instructions (Isaiah 24)

The first sequence is called the seal dooms; next come the trumpet dooms; and finally the bowl or vial dooms. These dooms proceed through the tribulation with increasing intensity and rapidity. The seven seal dooms wipe out one-fourth of the unrepentant people of the world but leave the earth otherwise untouched. The seven trumpet dooms exterminate one-third of the remaining unrepentant people and devastate one-third of the planet. The final seven dooms, the bowl or vial dooms, are universal. They destroy all remaining unrepentant people and desolate the entire earth. The seal dooms begin to strike during the first half of the tribulation and continue through to the middle of the tribulation (Rev. 6-8:1). The trumpet dooms fall after the middle of the tribulation (Rev. 8:7 - 12:6). The bowls (or vials) are poured out just prior to the end of the tribulation (Rev. 16:1-21).

The first four dooms in each sequence are physical. The last three of each sequence are spiritual dooms with physical consequences. The last doom in each sequence begins with a fearsome declaration by God that a new dispensation in His dealings with men is about to unfold (Revelation 7:10, 11:18, and 16:17), and this declaration is accompanied by thunder, earthquakes, hail, and other physical phenomena.

- 5) prepare our schedules, homes, and spirits for the opportunities God will give us.
- 6) commit ourselves to ministries that God praises even if men do not.
- 7) appreciate persecution as God's tool for breaking down the world's barriers to believing the gospel.
- 8) value humble, gentle restoration as the love that heals.
- 9) stand in awe of our responsibilities in having been given so much.
- from idolatry by fully honoring God with our wealth.

A PATTERN FOR THE CHRISTIAN LIFE

- Hate the evil in this world (Psalm 101:3, Proverbs 8:13, Isaiah 59:4-8). There is something desparately wrong with this world.
- Hate the evil within yourself (Psalm 51:3-5, Isaiah 59:10-14, Ezekiel 36:31). I am hopelessly sinful.
- Recognize God's justice (Psalm 5:4-6, Isaiah 59:2, Habakkuk 1:13). God is too holy to tolerate my sinfulness.
- Receive God's mercy (Luke 1:50, John 3:16, Ephesians 2:8-9).

 God is too loving to leave me a captive to evil (if I want to be rescued).
- Receive God's healing (Romans 12:1-2, I Peter 2:24, I John 2:13).

 God will sanctify/transform me (as I let Him).
- Offer God's mercy to others (Matthew 10:32-33, II Corinthians 5:20, I Peter 3:15-16).

 God's healing is so good it must be shared with others.
- Receive persecution (Romans 8:17, Philippians 1:29, II Timothy 3:12). The world will test my testimony of God's grace.
- Persist in offering God's mercy to others (Matthew 5:44, Philippians 1:27-29, II Timothy 1:7-8).

 God's love enables me to endure all things (as I am willing).
- Suffer more severe persecution (Matthew 24:8-12, Acts 8:1, Revelation 2: 9-10).

 Here is the ultimate test of a world wavering in its doubts.
- Radiate God's supernatural joy and supernatural purity (Acts 6:15, I Peter 4:1-2, I Peter 4:13-14).

 Here is my ultimate testimony to an unbelieving world.
- Partake in God's justice (Psalm 149:6-9, Malachi 4:3, Revelation 17:14).

 He will give me not a spirit of condemnation, but a spirit of holiness and purity.

LAST DAYS SURVIVAL KIT

(or, praising God for the privilege of being alive in the last days)

A good example of how to use this "doomsday" message comes from my pastor, Dick Anderson. He was visiting a heart attack victim in an intensive care unit at a hospital. The hospital staff would only allow him five minutes. Satan was haunting Dick not to disturb this man with the news of the imminent Tribulation and the second coming of Jesus Christ. But, Dick put old Satan aside by recognizing that not to share such important news would be even more disturbing. In two minutes he shared with this man the prophecied dooms and the deliverance, victory, and glory Jesus promises all believers. In the remaining three minutes that man asked Jesus to come into his heart. In those minutes Dick watched on an oscilloscope that man's heart beat strengthen and change from an erratic pulse to a steady regular 72 beats per minute.

You see, that man had found hope. He know all along that the world was on a collision course with disaster. What a release to discover that God had it all planned! What a hope to discover that Jesus will free us from the consequences of the dooms and deliver us to life everlasting! Jesus is the peace that surpasses all understanding!

It was our prayer in preparing this message that each of us would be filled with a deep sense of commitment to Jesus Christ. It is our belief that one purpose of the last days is to drive true believers into close fellowship with each other. The excitement of the last days is that each of us may get a little taste of the fantastic love and fellowship with each other and with Christ that will be ours for eternity in heaven. Dare we settle for less?

assignment: As Christians living in the last days, we should be re-evaluating our walk in the light of several key questions. Suggested key ques-

tions together with some scriptural clues are presented on the following pages.

Form a group. Break your group into subgroups of three or four. Assign one of the key questions to each subgroup. Each member of the subgroup should meditate in private on the scriptures pertaining to his subgroup's question noting other scriptures that may apply and writing out paraphrases, personal applications, and specific examples. The members of a subgroup should then meet to share their private meditations. Afterwards they should pray to God for insight, understanding, and wisdom. In the light of what was shared

each member should again meditate in private attempting this time to seek a coherent analysis or message. A second meeting of the subgroup would have as its goal to synthesize their meditations into a twelve minute oral presentation and a one or two page written summary. The entire group would then meet to hear and discuss the twelve minute presentations of the subgroups and to receive the written summaries. After a time of prayer to ask the Lord to bless the project and to provide illuminating insight the group should break up into new subgroups consisting of members who have worked on other and different key questions. The whole sequence would be repeated, but this time it would end in twenty to thirty minute talks and five to six page summaries.

The project can stop here, but should not. New subgroups can be formed to synthesize the findings of three or four other subgroups which would result in the group putting out a "survival report." The project can be used as a means of outreach. Christians can work with non-Christians. Group members can recruit outside manpower. For example, ask non-members to type or criticize your report. New members can be infused as the project develops. During the course of study other key questions are bound to arise. The group can be expanded to handle the additional questions, or alternately a small group could tackle them sequentially.

May you be filled with the love of Jesus, the wisdom of the Father, and be guided by the Holy Spirit. See I Thes. 4:18.

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When Jesus' disciples questioned Him about the time of His return to Earth and asked for some signs of the end of the age, Jesus replied by giving a long list of indicators, then concluded with this statement:
"I tell you the truth, this generation will certainly not pass away until all these things have happened." (Matt. 24:34, Mark 13:30, Luke 21:32). "All these things" include His physical return; so, it becomes clear that at least some of those people who are alive to see the various indicators occurring all around them also will witness Christ's second coming.


The list which Jesus gave, along with some clues given by the prophet, Daniel, focuses primarily on the beginning of that "last generation" time period. Many of the signs He described are phenomena that have existed throughout human history, while others are one-time events. For each of the long standing indicators, the thing to look for is a dramatic and unprecedented increase in number and intensity. As such, these signs have appeared between 1940 and 1960, with the average falling around 1950. (See examples on the following page). Here is the list of the signs:

- 1) explosive increase in human knowledge (Dan. 12:4).
- 2) vast increase in travel (Dan. 12:4).
- 3) appearance of many false Christs (Matt. 24:5,23,26; Mark 13:6,21).
- 4) numerous and intense wars (Matt. 24:6; Mark 13:7).
- 5) numerous rumors of wars (Matt. 24:6; Mark 13:7).
 6) numerous and widespread national conflicts (Matt. 24:7; Mark 13:8).
- 7) great earthquakes in various places (Matt. 24:7; Mark 13:8; Luke 21:11).
- 8) great famines in various places (Matt. 24:7; Mark 13:8; Luke 21:11).
 9) widespread hate and persecution of Christians (Matt. 24:9; Mark 13:9,13).
- 10) spread of the gospel to all nations (Matt. 24:14; Mark 13:10).
- 11) rebellion in the homes of unbelievers (Mark 13:12; II Tim. 3:2).
- 12) rise of numerous cults accompanied by Satanic miracles (Matt. 24:11,24; Mark 13:22; I Tim. 4:1-4).
- 13) rebirth of Israel as a Jewish nation (Dan. 8 and 9; Ezek. 36, 37, and 38; Matt. 24:32; Mark 13:28).
- 14) callous attitude among unbelievers (Is. 22:13; Matt. 24:12).
- 15) widespread apostasy (Matt. 24:10; II Thes. 2:3; I Tim. 4:1-4). 16) widespread revelry, "partying" (Matt. 24:38).
- 17) widespread ignorance of the calamitous situation (Matt. 24:39).
- 18) numerous revolutions and civil wars (Luke 21:9).
- 19) widespread attacks by pestilence (Luke 21:11).
- 20) unusual occurrences in the heavens (Luke 21:25).
- 21) perplexity and anxiety about storms (Luke 21:25).
- 22) apprehension about what is happening to the world (Luke 21:26).
- 23) healing in the homes of Christians (Mal. 4:5-6).
- 24) unprecedented godlessness and debauchery (II Tim. 3:1-9; II Tim. 4:3-4).
- 25) scoffing attitude towards Biblical prophecies about "the end" (II Pet. 3:3-15).

How long is a generation?

In the Old Testament a generation is the period of time during which a person is able to function physically and mentally as an adult, roughly between ages 20 and 60 or 70. At least twice in scripture, statements similar to that in Matt. 24, Mark 13, and Luke 21 appear. One refers to the Jews' wandering in the wilderness until Moses' generation died off --38 years (Num. 14:29-30), and the other to the destruction of the second temple during the disciples generation -- 40 years (Matt. 24:2; Luke 19:44).

DEALING WITH DEMONS

Demons: evil spirits, angelic being who joined with Satan in his rebellion against God in the kingdom of heaven (Rev. 12:4)

Demon oppression: mild to severe harassment by evil spirit(s) resulting from the opening of some door(s) to Satan's influence.

Demon possession: the condition in which one or more evil spirits inhabit the body of a human being, taking complete control of it at will and expressing his (or their) personality through that body.

Symptoms of demon oppression: (caution: some of these may simply be the result of unconfessed sin or unconquered sin habits in the life of the believer)

- 1. abnormal, irrational fear
- 2. abnormal, irrational anxiety
- 3. abnormal, irrational loneliness
- 4. severe and/or persistent depression that is not physiologically induced
- 5. lack of self-control
- 6. aimlessness; the feeling that life is void of any purpose or meaning
- 7. conflicts with authority figures
- 8. violent, reckless behavior
- 9. loss of the fear of God
- 10. outbursts of hatred
- 11. selfish ambition, especially an appetite for power
- 12. irrationality; inability to detect or correct contradictions or other fallacious reasoning

Open doors to demon oppression:

- 1. indulgence in occultic music, literature, art, dancing, etc.
- 2. possession (known or unknown) of occultic records, tapes, books, pictures, charms, tools, games, etc.
- 3. grudges against God and others
- 4. poor self-image
- 5. rebellion against authority
- 6. dating relationships or close friendships with demon oppressed or possessed people
- 7. sexual immorality with demon oppressed or possessed people
- 8. authority figures' acceptance of Satanic influence
- 9. seeking or giving consent to occultic power or occultic revelation
- 10. fascination with occultic power, occultic revelation, or psychic phenomena, in general

- 11. rejection of what is know and understood to be true
- 12. participation in false religions or cults
- 13. wrong use of drugs and/or alcohol
- 14. wrong use of herbs
- 15. escapism through thrill-seeking, science fiction, soap operas, or some other addicting hobby/activity
- 16. hedonism; an absorbing pursuit of entertainment and/or body pleasure
- 17. fascination with violence, especially violence devoid of justice; sadism and/or masochism
- 18. prolonged or persistent jealousy
- 19. bad temper or stubbornness
- 20. pornography
- 21. fascination with UFO phenomena; attempts to contact extraterrestrial beings
- 22. prolonged sleeplessness
- 23. meditation on anything other than God's revealed truth
- 24. chanting or other cultic/occultic forms of worship
- 25. any contact with demon oppressed or possessed people that threatens the demon(s)

Symptoms of demon possession:

- 1. intense, maniacal delight in wielding power
- 2. total incapability of submitting to any but demonic authority
- 3. filthy, uncontrolled swearing without provocation, even toward total strangers*
- 4. irreverent, vile, lewd comments about members of the Godhead; comments attributing gross sexual immorality to Jesus*
- 5. sustained supernatural strength or intelligence beyond that which might come from adrenalin or some other physiological source*
- 6. irrationality to the degree that even the simplest spiritual truths are beyond comprehension
- 7. intense, highly disturbed reaction to the mentions of Jesus' name and Jesus' blood shed on the cross for man's sin*
- 8. possession of supernatural, occultic power(s) e.g. ability to foretell future events, to levitate tables or other objects, or to travel outside the body, etc.
- 9. wild, unnatural facial contortions
- 10. presence of two or more distinguishable, coherent personalities, personalities capable of expressing themselves simultaneously (may include emergence of strange voices, dual or multiple voices, and/or unnatural conversations)*
- 11. unexplainable, uncontrollable terror especially in the presence of Christians whose faith is strong* (this terror arises either from the

- demon's fear of being cast out or from the possessed person's fear upon being cruelly threatened by the demon(s)
- 12. violent reckless behavior of an extreme sort, e.g. throwing knives, playing with poisonous snakes, etc.**
- 13. severe, persistent depression, despondency and/or temptations to commit suicide**
- 14. total lack of self-restraint, especially with respect to sexual behavior; uncontrolled sexual advances
- 15. extreme disregard for physical appearance and/or physical well-being**
- 16. intense loneliness, even in the midst of warm, compassionate fellowship
- * conclusive evidence of possession
- ** The demon's goal is to get the possessed person to kill himself and/or others before he or they act on the opportunity to be saved and become Christ's "captives."

Open doors to demon possession:

- 1. holding on to deep-seated grudges against God and others
- 2. giving consent to occultic power or revelation, e.g. going to a fortune teller, having an astrological chart or forecast made, etc.
- 3. craving and seeking after occultic power or revelation, e.g. taking e.s.p. tests or other psychic aptitude tests
- 4. possessing and/or using occultic tools, charms, books, music, souvenirs, etc.
- 5. having parents or other close authority figures open doors to Satan's influence
- 6. blaspheming the Holy Spirit; i.e. repeatedly and consistently rejecting the work of the Holy Spirit as He reveals truth and convicts of sin
- 7. grossly and habitually rebelling against authority
- 8. habitually participating in gross sexual immorality

Closing doors to demon oppression and possession:

- 1. Examine you life for any and all open doors.
- 2. Repent of opening those doors (except in the case of #25, p.2), and confess as sin the opening of doors by your authority figures.
- 3. Take action to demonstrate repentance and to purify your life, including the following:
 - a.) Release resentment/grudges against God and others, and seek forgiveness of those you have offended by your resentment.
 - b.) Repudiate and renounce any and all occultic involvement; seek forgiveness of those you have offended by it; totally destroy all books and other objects connected with it.
 - c.) Get back under the authority of your parents, husband, pastor,

- elders, boss, teachers, and/or others against whom you rebelled; again, seek forgiveness wherever necessary.
- 4. Ask Jesus Christ to take complete control of your life-- with His will supreme, not your own. Dedicate your heart, soul, mind, and strength to be used for His glory, for the fulfillment of His purposes.

How to be set free from possession:

With an intense effort of your will, seek the help of God and of strong, mature Christians. Attempt to communicate your desire to be set free.

Casting out demons:

- 1. Make sure the possessed person encountered truly is possessed. Seek confirmation.
- 2. Exercise empathic repentance first, closing any open doors to demon influence in your own life.
- 3. Get not only the consent of the possessed person, but also that of his/her key authority figures, to cast the demon(s) out (Luke 11:24-26).
- 4. Enlist the help of five or more physically and spiritually strong Christians.
- 5. Do <u>NOT</u> lay hands on the possessed person, except as necessary to prevent bodily harm.
- 6. Identify the demon (or each demon, in cases where there are more than one) by asking him to give his name.
- 7. In the name of Jesus and by the power of His shed blood, command the demon(s) to leave.
- 8. Watch for deception--Remember: there may be more than just one or two.
- 9. In cases where a demon is particularly stubborn, engage in group fasting and prayer (Mark 9:25-29).
- 10. Carefully and diligently lead the person through each step of closing doors to demon oppression/possession (given above). Remember that bringing the person to salvation, to the indwelling of God's Spirit, is the only prevention for further demon possession (Mark 9:25-29).
- 11. Stay close to the new convert and help him get involved in a solid program of discipleship in fellowship with other believers.
